



Prayer

- Over 28,000 candles were lit in the Grotto.
- Seven of our sisters are active Spiritual Directors, who collectively led more than 1,500 meetings annually.
- More than 7,300 prayer requests were received.
- More than 400 names were received for prayer for All Souls Day.
- The sisters formally gather for communal prayer more than 1,000 sessions each year.

Service to Others

- The sisters minister in diverse ways teaching, serving in parishes, offering retreats, prison ministry, counseling individuals, working with immigrant populations, and helping the homeless and the poor.
- Sisters bring service to others by providing food / items of need for the Blessing Cabinet, ministry to incarcerated women, services with the Homeland Security Immigration Office, Texas/Mexico border ministry, the Women of the Church conference, tutoring and music lessons to others, the Dove Recovery House for Women, and teaching religious education.
- Our vocations outreach touches the lives of more than 1,000 people each year.
- Over 900 children attend St. Rita's Catholic School in Peru, where sisters are teachers and administrators.
- Our sisters are teaching students from kindergarten through high school and even those attending seminary.
