We are excited to partner with them in bringing this endeavor to Indiana.

In addition, earlier this year we approved a project to bring geothermal energy to campus. In the coming months, wells will be dug to provide geothermal energy for our buildings. Doing so lessens our utility bills and also helps to reduce our carbon footprint. Other building repair projects continue, including making needed upgrades and repairs to St. Benedict Hall, last fully renovated in 1995.

As we move into the summer months, I hope that some of you will be able to come for a visit. It's always a pleasure to welcome you back to campus, and we encourage you to walk the grounds, visit the church, and inquire about some of your teachers. I look forward to seeing many of you this fall for the annual reunion.

The Lasting Impact of the Academy

rowing up, I often heard my mom talk about her years in the Academy, and the time after as she contemplated taking orders. We would tease one another about it — after all, if she'd taken orders, I wouldn't be here. But her stories about the Academy and the convent contained a powerful message that I have returned to again and again.

My mom entered the Academy carrying a heavy set of expectations from her family and from herself. Her sister had taken orders, and her mother expected my mom to do the same. Her path had been laid out for her. In her year of discernment after the Academy, though, my mom came to understand that she wanted something different, and made the difficult choice to set aside other people's expectations to pursue her own path.

She chose, in many ways, the harder option. Though she went straight to work, she could only scrape together enough money for a few years of college before she had to leave university and take up a full-time job. (She would return to college nearly four decades later to finish her degree.) But in the years that followed, she built the life that she had dreamt of when she left the convent.


I've always believed that it was her time at the Academy that empowered her to make that choice. Standing at a crossroads in her life, she knew enough about who she was and what she was capable of to step into the unknown. Her courage and commitment in that moment have inspired me every time I have been at a crossroads in my own life — which means I owe a debt of gratitude to the Academy as well.

A Hidden Passion

athleen "Kathy" Schnepp originally had no aspirations to work in the newspaper industry. Her dream was to attend law school and become a successful civil rights, environmental, or government attorney. However,

her perspective changed when she realized that attorneys sometimes have to defend individuals they know are guilty.

She grew up in a small city in Illinois and attended Marian Heights Academy in Ferdinand, Indiana. During her time



In 1990, Kathy convinced her husband, her sister-in-law Miriam, and her husband Paul Ash to purchase *The Ferdinand News*, a community newspaper that had been in the same family since 1906. They also acquired *The Dale News*, which later became the *Spencer County Leader*. "I loved the community. They deserved a hometown newspaper," she recalls. Kathy became the editor of both papers and worked to improve their journalistic standards. Over the years, both newspapers have received numerous awards for excellence in writing, photography, advertising, graphics, and design.

Kathy served as co-publisher alongside her husband until he retired in 2016. She continued as the sole publisher and has personally won awards for her comprehensive stories on several social issues. She is also actively involved in various boards and charities, holding leadership positions and making a significant impact in her community.

Kathy has served as a mentor to her staff and has managed to keep both newspapers thriving, even during the challenges of a global pandemic. Despite the decline of newspapers in the digital age, circulation figures for both papers continue to grow.

Apart from her dedication to journalism, Kathy has a passion for history and is a member of multiple historical societies. She and her husband purchased the historic Wollenmann House, restored it, and donated it to the Ferdinand Historical Society.

Kathy's accomplishments have been recognized internationally, as she is a member of the prestigious International Society of Weekly Newspaper Editors. In 2023, she was elected to their board of directors.

Outside of work, Kathy prioritizes her family, having raised three successful children and spending time with her five beloved grandchildren. She has also formed close bonds with several elderly women, ensuring they have the support and assistance they need.

Throughout her journey, Kathy has demonstrated her resilience, passion, and leadership skills, leaving a lasting impact on the newspaper industry and her community.
